One: Gracious God, we raise voices hoarse from shouting alleluias, we sing praises for the wonder of an empty tomb, we give thanks for the gifts of life, of life that breaks the bonds of death.

All: We sing songs of praise for the world you have given us, for the beauty of the earth, for the glory of the skies.

One: As the spring deepens and the earth thaws, as green breaks through the brown of winter,

All: we sing songs of hope for new life springing from dead soil, for the promise held in every seed that is sown.

One: As people of faith we remember all those who have gone before.

All: People like Moses and Miriam, leading their people to freedom;

like Sarah and Abraham, seeking a new life in a strange land;

like Peter and Mary, proclaiming an empty tomb and life beyond the cross.

One: We remember these and many others, named and unnamed, who have embraced Your life, Your hope, and moved into a new age.

All: And we trust that in remembering and retelling their stories, we too can take the leap into New Life.

One: Deep among all those memories we remember the life of a Special One.

All: Jesus, Child of Mary.

One: Born of a woman, he grew to adulthood among people who struggled daily for life.

All: Baptized by John, he embraced the life to which You called him.

One: He taught and preached a vision of a world where all divisions were broken down, where all had what they needed for abundant life, where the Reign of God was as real on earth as in heaven.

All: And though the powerful in his world fought back, he stood strong.

One: When offered a chance to take the easy way he overcame his own fear and instead prayed "yet Thy will be done."

All: Even though they put him to death you raised him to life, vindicating his vision and bringing hope and healing to the world.

One: As inheritors of that hope we join together in the cries that welcomed him into Jerusalem, the cries of hope for the world:

All: Hosanna! Holy One!

Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest!

REMEMBERING

One: As we gather at this table, we remember a story told mere days ago and yet also an age ago. We remember that Jesus gathered with his closest friends in an Upper Room to share the feast of liberation. And while sharing the ancient story of freedom, he called them to remember the promised freedom of God's Kingdom.

We remember that at that table he took the bread, gave thanks for it, blessed it, broke it and passed it among them saying: This is my body, broken by and for the world. Whenever you eat it remember me.

Then later he took the cup of wine, blessed it and passed it among them saying: This is the cup of the New Covenant, sealed in my blood. Whenever you drink it, remember me, and look toward the fulfilment of God's Kingdom.

And so we break the bread and pour the cup and we remember with hope.

All: On this Easter Day we share in the Banquet of Freedom to celebrate Life Victorious!

COMMUNION PRAYER

One:

God of Life, in the beginning your Spirit hovered over the water, calling forth life, creating and inspiring. Send Your Spirit upon we who gather to share this meal, infuse this bread and this juice with the Spirit's power.

As we eat and drink my we feel the power of Life Triumphant pulse in our veins, the fire of hope blaze in our hearts, and the joy of the Empty tomb dance in our souls.

Christ who died is now alive!

All: Alleluia! Amen.



In 1749, an English translation of this fourteenth-century Latin hymn dropped all but the first stanza of the original. Most hymnbooks have used that (1749) version. In this new translation the original Latin verses of the medieval text are restored, thus bringing to life the original Easter narrative. Ingathering Sunday

Next Sunday, April 19, will be **Ingathering Sunday** at DCC, the third Sunday of the month when we traditionally bring donations of canned and other nonperishable food to share with our neighbors who struggle to feed their families, through the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano. In this time of sheltering in place, when we are unable to collect and distribute your food donations, we will observe Ingathering Sunday by inviting you to donate online, either through the DCC donations web page or directly to the Food Bank.

Easter Offering

Through our Easter offering, we can express our love and compassion by reaching out to our neighbors, near and far, who need a helping hand. The Outreach Commission has selected our local **Axis Community Health** and Guatemala's **Pop No'j** as equal recipients of our Easter offering this year because of the effective services they provide to two very different populations.



Axis Community Health is a Tri-Valley community health center that provides quality, affordable, accessible and compassionate health care services that promote the well-being of all members of the community. Axis Community Health began in 1972 as a health center for low-income children in Eastern Alameda County who had no other access to health care. Over the past forty-five years, Axis has grown to provide medical care for all ages, as well as mental health counseling services, addiction recovery programs, court-ordered programs, a WIC nutrition program and school and

community-based health education services. Axis now offers services from five sites in the Tri-Valley area and serves more than 14,000 members of the community. In order to ensure that services are provided in a culturally-sensitive manner, the multi-lingual staff is representative of a variety of cultures and backgrounds. Axis' medical services are provided on a sliding fee scale based on income and family size. Axis will work with patients to provide the care they need regardless of income, insurance status, or ability to pay. They are now on the front lines of the COVID-19 crisis.



Pop No'j is a Guatemalan non-profit organization introduced to DCC's Sister Parish delegation to Guatemala last year. It is a Mayan human rights and dignity organization whose Migration Program focuses on accompanying children who have been separated from their parents in the U.S. or Mexico and are incarcerated and then deported. They have grown out of the forces that push immigration – which they have come to see as mostly acts of love for the families of those who attempt the trek – and the train wreck of children who have been separated from their parents, incarcerated, and then returned, often months after their parents. They have become the first line of contact with the returned children, providing care and counseling, in the native language of the children. They facilitate finding and returning those children to their families, and follow

them after their return to continue to provide counseling to both the children and their families. That counseling includes broad areas of support including how to protect and recover from physical and sexual violence, fear of soldiers and police, connections to local resources with whom they have developed partnerships, health issues, debt management, water purification, how to repatriate the dead. The current staff of 19 was handling a case load of 54 children in October, and they have been advised that the number of returned children in 2020 will be about 2,000, an overwhelming number. We can help bring their smiles, caring and expertise to a tender group of innocents who have suffered from our own U.S. policies.









