Worship Notes

Today's worship leadership was provided by **members of DCC who identify as LGBTQ+**. DCC is a richer, more complete community because of their presence and participation. We are grateful for their contributions today and in the life of our church.



On the cover: In June 2017, the city of Philadelphia adopted a revised version of the flag designed by the marketing firm Tierney that adds black and brown stripes to the top of the standard six-color Pride flag, to draw attention to issues of people of color within the LGBTQ community. Since then, communities around the world including, most recently, Dublin, Livermore, and San Ramon!—have adopted this particular flag to honor this call for diversity and solidarity with people of color. [Danville is flying the <u>six-color original flag</u> for <u>the first time this year</u>!] The Philly Pride flag is an inspiration for the Progress Pride Flag designed in 2018 by Portlandbased artist Daniel Quasar. This version of the flag foregrounds the causes of trans people (the colors of the trans flag) and queer people of color (particularly trans) who are the most marginalized among the LGBTQ community. "The inclusion of the

additional stripes means placing emphasis on voices that need to be heard, especially now even more so than two years ago when I originally made the flag," Quasar said. "Our world is so charged right now and the voices who have been screaming for years are getting louder and louder. We cannot ignore that and must make space for them to be heard. The flag was my way of saying we as a community need to step back and listen." <u>Read more here</u>. Further, many activists note, we would not have Pride were it not for the activism of transgender people of color. (<u>Read this for more information on that</u>.) [Note: Advocates have thusfar been unable to convince the Castro business district to adopt either of the more inclusive versions.]



Noted for her musical command, cosmopolitan artistry, and visionary independence, **Sara Davis Buechner** is one of the most original concert pianists of our time. Lauded for her "intelligence, integrity and all-encompassing technical prowess" (*New York Times*), "thoughtful artistry in the full service of music" (*Washington Post*), and "astounding virtuosity" (*Philippine Star*), Japan's *InTune* magazine sums up: "Buechner has no superior." As a prominent figure in music and proud transgender woman, Sara also appears at LGBTQ events to speak about her experience transitioning from David

to Sara Davis, at age 39. Feeling trapped but obligated to play the part of David, Sara felt herself depressed and suicidal—until she found the strength to become who she was always meant to be. Today, we sing five verses of Julian Rush's seven-verse *Ours the Journey*, a song (lyrics and tune) he wrote in the years immediately following his ouster from the church he was serving upon coming out as gay. The song, which can be viewed as a prayer, was first presented at the 1985 Rocky Mountain Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church at which the first Japanese-American United Methodist bishop was commissioned. This text celebrates diversity with the labels of gender, race, age, and sexual orientation named in the various stanzas. We have adapted the lyrics slightly to

make space between the binaries of "man" and "woman" and by including *trans* in verse 5; we have also substituted *Indigenous* for *Indian*. The song is rarely presented in its full seven-verse form (only five verses are included in our hymnal) which we have included in this bulletin. We concur with the Discipleship Ministries of the United Methodist Church who <u>wrote in 2018</u>, "*In the Midst of New Dimensions* is just as relevant today as it was at its creation, now thirty-three years ago. The first stanza begins 'In the midst of new dimensions, in the face of changing ways', which certainly describes the present world. The prayers of many Christians include the sentiments of Rush's text, and God still guides all of God's people." Tiq Milan is a writer, public speaker, activist, and strategic media consultant. He is currently a national spokesperson for <u>GLAAD</u> and the former senior media strategist of national news at GLAAD. Prior to his current roles, he was a mentor and teacher at the <u>Hetrick-Martin Institute</u>, an LGBTQ youth nonprofit organization in NYC. As a Public Speaker and Thought Leader, Tiq shares his story of being transgender and how that informs his views on masculinity, race and gender. He travels throughout North America leading discussions on healthy modes of masculinity, inclusive leadership and creating cultures of consent. He has lectured at several universities

including Harvard, Stanford, and Brown on the importance of inclusion as tool of innovation and outlines concrete strategies for productive engagement. He recently participated in Day one of the <u>Black Queer Town Hall</u> on June 19, 2020 and is the author of this June 9, 2020 NBC News article "<u>When</u> <u>Black lives matter</u>, <u>Black trans people must be freed from discrimination and violence</u>." <u>Watch Tiq's</u> <u>TEDWomen talk presented with his wife Kim Katrin Milan here</u>. <u>Read more about Tiq here</u>.



Senior Minister Carmarion D. Anderson is a vibrant and visible trans woman of color with a passion for inclusion and equality for all. Carmarion is the Alabama State Director with the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) under the Project One America initiative—a comprehensive, multi-hear campaign to dramatically expand LGBTQ equality in the South. Carmarion becomes the first trans person of color to serve in a leadership role with HRC in the organization's history. Before joining HRC and relocating to Alabama, Carmarion worked in the field of Public Health and Education, managing both local and national prevention initiatives focusing on HIV/AIDS and

other health disparities that impact marginalized communities. Carmarion is the founder and previous Executive Director for <u>Black Transwomen, Inc.</u>, which is the first national non-profit organization with a 501 (c)(3) with a programmatic focus to uplift the voices, hearts, and souls of black trans women and in alliance with the Black Trans Advocacy Coalition. Carmarion also brings a wealth of experience in faith spaces, currently serving as the National Co-Minister and South Regional Coordinator for TransSaints ministry of The Fellowship of Affirming Ministries (TFAM). Carmarion is recently in her 16-year serving as an associate elder/minister at the Living Faith Covenant Church, located in Dallas, Texas. Carmarion was born and reared in Dallas, Texas, with family roots from Natchez, Mississippi. Carmarion is a wife, a parent of one son, and a grandparent to three adorable grandchildren.

The gospel song *We Shall Overcome* has become one of the most widely known civil rights anthems framing all kinds of marches, protests, and gatherings of people placing their hope in the promise of justice realized. The song has been referenced by a variety of civil rights leaders of all ages, from Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. to President Barack Obama. In Rev. King's final sermon on March 31, 1968, just days before his death: "There's a little song that we sing in our movement down in the South. I don't know if you've heard it," King told the Memphis crowd. "You know, I've joined hands so often with students and others behind jail bars singing it: 'We shall overcome.' Sometimes we've had tears in our eyes when we joined together to sing it, but we still decided to sing it: 'We shall overcome.' Oh,



before this victory's won, some will have to get thrown in jail some more, but we shall overcome." <u>Read The Atlantic's fascinating</u> <u>history of this civil rights anthem</u>. The performance presented during worship today was <u>performed</u> <u>on June 19, 2020 during day 1 of the Black Queer Town Hall</u> by openly gay Broadway stars Christian Dante White (*My Fair Lady*)

and Nick Rashad Burroughs (*Tina: The Tina Turner Musical*). In the

context of 2020 America, *We Shall Overcome* frames the hopes of queer Black people and other people of color within both the gay rights movement and the movement for Black lives.



In addition to our regular gifts and offerings, today we have the opportunity to bless the work of an organization in Alabama striving to support the Queer and Trans community there. The Knights & Orchids Society, or TKO, strives to build the power of the TLGB community for African Americans throughout rural areas in Alabama and across the south, to obtain our dream of justice and equality through group economics, education, leadership development, and organizing cultural work. TKO was founded and

is led by Black, queer, transgender, and gender non-conforming (TGNC) people, including many who are living with HIV, are youth, and are low-income people in rural and isolated areas of Alabama. In addition to helping supply funds so TKO can provide the basic needs of additional food, diapers, depends, cleaning supplies for black rural Alabamians, <u>TKO is purchasing the building their organization is housed in</u>. Permanent ownership of their building, located within an opportunity zone at the foot of the historic Edmund Pettus Bridge, will provide TKO a sustainable place to train and skill-up the next generation of TGNC leaders.


Quentin Bell, TKO's executive director said, "Black Trans and LGBQ folks have rarely had opportunities to define space, acquire ownership, and invest. We have always had to borrow or create spaces (without ownership) that empower, uplift, and unite. Imagine the power we would hold and the work we could accomplish if we owned land where we could build and invest. Each generation should not have to keep starting from zero. Ownership is ground zero and the foundation upon which future generations will begin to build and sustain generational wealth. If you're able to give, I would deeply appreciate your contribution. Any amount makes a difference!"

TKO needs just under \$3,000 to reach their goal of \$75,000 to own their building! The classic **Somewhere Over the Rainbow**, composed by Harold Arlen with lyrics by Yip Harburg, was written for the 1939 film *The Wizard of Oz*. The song, performed by Judy Garland, received the 1940 Academy Award for Best Original Song. This morning we are treated to **Mary-Marie Deauclaire**'s rendition of this classic, recorded in her home last month to not only help her during this time of quarantine but as a gift to DCC today. She says she loves playing this song "because

it's about daring to dream and when you hear it your troubles melt away."


interest in being part of this leadership group, and explaining why you feel called to this work and what your strengths are that you wish to share with the team.
