Our upcoming Lenten Series, **Embodied: The Body Remembers**, explores the connection between our minds, bodies, and spirits, as well as our connection to one another as the Body of Christ. This Lenten season we will wonder: How does suffering in our bodies carry over to our lives, hearts, and communities? How can we share in healing together?

Lent is traditionally a time to focus on fasting from something (giving up something), denying the body in order to grow spiritually. How do our spiritual lives sustain our declining bodies?

When we acknowledge the physical experience of others in our community, it calls us "to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly." We will explore the ways Jesus integrated his humanity and divinity to fulfill his radical ministry. We will discern how we are continually invited to bring all of who we are to God, to live out the radical love that chooses to be embodied in us.

This Lent, join us as we explore the connection between our bodies and spirituality. In doing so, may we find healing and wholeness within and among the Body of Christ.

L4L: Labyrinths for Lent

As we approach the season of Lent, we invite you to embark on a journey of spiritual reflection and renewal with us through the practice of "Labyrinths for Lent." Labyrinths have been used for centuries as sacred spaces for prayer, meditation, and self-discovery, offering a unique opportunity to engage our physical bodies in the process of spiritual growth.



We are excited to offer two organized opportunities for congregants to walk a labyrinth together as a community. These organized walks will take place on **Friday, March 15 at 5:00 pm at the home of Carol Gilliland for a TGIF gathering.** The second organized walk will take place during Holy Week, Tuesday, March 26 from 11:00 am to 12:30 pm at Carol's home. For those unable to walk but would like to gather with community, we will have finger labyrinths available that you can use with your hands.

We understand that not everyone may be available to join us on these specific dates. Therefore, we have also compiled a list of local labyrinths that you can visit at your own convenience throughout the Lenten season. These labyrinths serve as quiet sanctuaries for personal reflection and prayer, allowing you to engage in the spiritual practice of labyrinth walking whenever it fits into your schedule. Some local labyrinths that we recommend include:

- St. Timothy's Church 1550 Diablo Road, Danville park at the far east end of the parking lot also has stations of the cross
- Peace Lutheran Church 3201 Camino Tassajara, Danville park on Old Blackhawk Road
- Hap Magee Park 1027 La Gonda Way, Danville from the parking lot take the path past the gazebo
- Unity of Walnut Creek 1871 Geary Road, Walnut Creek small but sweet, easy access from the parking lot
- San Damiano Retreat 710 Highland Drive, Danville okay to visit during the week only (not on weekends), please check in at the desk before you start.

If you would like to expand your labyrinth walking, this website provides a great list of Bay Area labyrinths: Ronnie's Awesome List or Labyrinth Locator.

There are plenty of opportunities to engage with our Lenten spiritual practice. You can:

- visit a different labyrinth each week or visit the same one each week
- invite someone to go with you or go alone
- set an intention before starting each time, pray for someone or something while you are
 walking, read a piece of scripture or a poem before or after, or just be open to what comes to
 you
- make it into a day trip and take a drive to one of the locations in the greater Bay Area
- if you are traveling, use the Labyrinth Locator to find a labyrinth near you
- share back with your pastors if you find a labyrinth you think others would like to try

Whether you join us for one of the organized walks or choose to explore a labyrinth on your own, we encourage you to embrace this opportunity for spiritual contemplation and renewal during Lent. May this practice deepen your connection with the Divine and foster a sense of peace and clarity in your journey of faith. In 2004, the Danville Congregational Church took a significant step by approving the creation of the Endowment Fund and establishing its bylaws. This strategic move laid the foundation for a lasting impact on the church's mission and outreach. The bylaws outline the operational plan, including the formation of an Endowment Committee entrusted with overseeing the accumulation, management, and distribution of funds. The current committee comprises Syd Dent, Carol Gerich, Joy Davis, and is chaired by Pat McGrath.

According to the bylaws, the primary purpose of the Endowment Fund is to enhance the mission and outreach of the Danville Congregational Church. The guiding principle ensures that the principal remains preserved, and only the income generated from managed investments is utilized. This sustainable approach allows the Endowment



Committee to evaluate and allocate funds for long-term projects, contributing to the church's continued growth.

Since its inception in 2004, the Endowment Fund has grown to approximately \$600,000. The distributions over the years have amounted to over \$220,000 and have significantly contributed to the church's various initiatives, fostering a sense of community and purpose.

As co-coordinator, with Carrie Stengel, of DCC's Sister Parish Prayer Ministry, I thought I would share a recent experience that provides further support for my belief in the power of prayer. At a recent luncheon with a fellow clergy person, whom I have served in ministry with, she presented me with a copy of one of her paintings reproduced into a card. The story behind the painting was so inspiring to me that I thought it would be inspiring to prayer partners at DCC as well. Here is the story behind the painting sent to me by the artist, a UCC clergy person living in the Bay Area, The Reverend Gayle "Asali" Dickson.

"Cora Brown and I went to South Carolina in 2004 to visit her friend Jackie. The lady in the blue dress had breast cancer and is a member of Jackie's church. Jackie told Cora the church was praying for her healing and Cora asked me to pray for the Member, which I started doing

from the pulpit every Sunday. One day of our visit Cora, Jackie and I were preparing to go to the Gulla Islands when the Member just popped in unannounced. After she was introduced to me and Cora, I asked if we could pray over her. She agreed immediately and Cora, Jackie and I laid hands on her, and I began to pray over her for a healing. Cora was already sitting down in the chair because at the time she was in need of a knee or hip operation. Jackie and I were standing. I started praying and the energy got so strong Bob, I began to feel a tingling from my head to my toes. (I couldn't stop praying -- until I was done, or the spirit was done with me.). The energy knocked Jackie to the floor. I check in with Cora every now and then to hear how things are going with the Member. Last we heard she was cancer free. This experience is affirmation for me that miracles do happen, and prayers can be healing. They take focus and clarity. I have not been able to duplicate exactly that experience or feeling since, but I was able to memorialize it so I will never forget. And I drew it as testimony to the power of the Way of God as shown to us through Jesus Christ."
