


# The Good News



Beloved friends,

The month of May is a month focused on the theme of Stewardship. This year's stewardship theme, has been thoughtfully and lovingly named, "Sharing Our Story. Building Our Future. Growing Our Dreams."

Throughout this month, you will have several opportunities to learn more about stewardship here at DCC by way of three gatherings throughout the month of May: May 1, 4, and 11. At these gatherings, the Stewardship Narrative and Booklet will be distributed. Within the booklet, you will find a narrative of our church's story, the work we accomplished this past year, and the dreams we have for our future. You will also learn more about the preliminary budget for 2018-19. This is all very exciting, and I am thankful for the team of folks who have contributed much to the formation of our stewardship campaign.

Now, I know when some of you hear the word "stewardship" your mind shifts to the topic of money. Yes, typically throughout the stewardship season there is information about a preliminary budget for the coming fiscal year and usually there is a commitment ask for all those who are members and friends of DCC. This is all very important, especially as it relates to the function of the church as an organization. However, whenever we hear a church talk about money, all people hear is the church *asking* for money. And there is this sense that when the church is asking for money, we're less likely to give.

According to the Giving USA Foundation, in 2013 philanthropy in the United States reached the same level of giving that it did in 2007 before the recession hit. Americans gave away 335 billion dollars in 2013. The news to giving to religion, however, was not nearly as positive. In 2008, gifts to religion as a percentage of the whole was 35 percent. In 2013, it had fallen to 31 percent. This is the lowest ever recorded for giving to religion. In the last two years, as giving has increased throughout the philanthropic world, we have seen that every single category has increased except religion. Secular organizations and charities – education, health, arts, environment, United Way – have all experienced increases in giving. Religion, specifically churches, has failed to increase.<sup>1</sup>

And so, I wonder, why?

In his book, *Not Your Parents Offering Plate*, pastor and author, J. Clif Christopher tells a story of when he taught a clergy seminar on stewardship. He put on a screen a laundry list of reasons why people give to an organization or charity. He then asked the pastors to choose which one is the number one reason people give. People started to blurt out, "taxes, guilt, involvement, etc." Finally, a woman who had been sitting in the back raised her hand and said, "Number one is a belief in the mission." Turns out, she was right.<sup>2</sup>

The number one reason why people generally give to an organization or charity is a **belief in the mission**. Which makes me wonder, church, have we lost sight of our mission? If giving to religion across the board



The Stewardship Narrative, which will be presented at our TGIF Gatherings throughout May, highlights many of the ways that we at DCC have supported one another and our community during the past year. This is how we share our story and build our future. There are many more examples of generosity not recorded in the narrative. Sometimes it's just a smile, a shared tear, a friendly handshake or a full-on bear hug that joins us. The narrative celebrates us and how we share God's message and bounty every day. As a congregation we've supported the realignment of our pastoral and office staff. We continue to reach out to those in need and support efforts to maintain our beautiful campus. Yes, it's good to celebrate.

Let's now look to the business of growing our dreams. Dreams empower us to do better and to do more. With input from the commissions, Council, staff and the congregation, our collective dreams are also highlighted within the forthcoming Stewardship Narrative. ## The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival

Fifty years ago last month, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated in Memphis as he joined sanitation workers there who were demanding better wages and working conditions. The campaign he was working on before his life was cut short was the Poor People's Campaign – an effort to link racial justice work and economic justice work across the country as the next phase of the Civil Rights Movement.

Now, a new Poor People's Campaign is emerging. **The Poor Peoples Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival** is uniting tens of thousands of people across the country to challenge the evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy and ecological devastation. Mother's Day, May 13<sup>th</sup>, will be the

launch of the campaign's 40 days of Nonviolent Moral Fusion Direct Action in 40 state capitols, including Sacramento, and in Washington, DC, that will include education, organizing, cultural arts, coalition-building and direct action. The commitment to nonviolence is central and the use of the word fusion addresses the intersectional connections of people and issues. There will be a national action in Washington, DC, on June 23. Visit [www.poorpeoplescampaign.org](http://www.poorpeoplescampaign.org) to sign up for more information – by joining the campaign you can receive updates on trainings and actions in our region. You can also find the campaign's statement of principles (see box below) and their recently released "**The Souls of Poor Folks,**" an audit of America 50 years after the first Poor People's Campaign launched in 1968, and the Poor People's Campaign Moral Agenda.

A few DCC folks, including Norman Bardsley, Marianne Clark and Doug Leich, have already joined the Poor People's Campaign and have committed to participating in coordinated direct actions in Sacramento, and perhaps more locally, during the 40 days of direct action. Others may wish to join them. Special training is required for those participating in the campaign's direct actions, but others may participate as witnesses. We encourage anyone with an interest in understanding the roots of this campaign to read *The Third Reconstruction – Moral Mondays, Fusion Politics and the Rise of a New Justice Movement*, 2016, by Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II, with Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove. Each week of the 40 days of direct action will have a different, nationally-coordinated theme, focusing on women, children and the disabled in the first week, moving to systemic racism in the second and then to the military economy in the third week. At DCC we will be following these themes each week and reflecting on the development of the Poor People's Campaign as it unfolds.

### Emmaus Teams to Replace Circles

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> day after Jesus died, two of the disciples were walking on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus when they came upon a stranger. They talked as they walked, and when the disciples reached their destination it was evening so they invited the stranger to come inside with them. When they sat down to eat together they realized that the stranger was actually Jesus. What a surprise!

When we reflected on this passage we realized that the disciples **welcomed a stranger** and that **it was in the breaking of bread** that they saw the face of God in this new friend. Well, we have the opportunity to share that welcome and hospitality each and every Sunday at DCC.

We have created seven brand new **Emmaus Teams** that will replace our current Circles. Teams will be responsible for worship support and hospitality (aka Sunday Tasks) every 8 weeks. And that's it! You help out once every eight weeks and the rest of the time you come to worship and fellowship time and are welcomed and fed by others. Each team will have a team leader who will organize the volunteers for their assigned Sunday. On the 8<sup>th</sup> Sunday we'll be trying something new – more on that next month.

You'll find out which team you are on at the Annual Meeting on June 11. **Emmaus Teams** will be responsible for worship support (greeter, usher, etc) and hospitality (fellowship host and snacks) beginning on **July 1**.

If you are currently in a circle and have participated in the past year, you will be on a team. If for any reason you would like to opt out (or opt in!) just let Kim know.

We will not have "back up" or "sister" teams. If everyone participates, each team will have more than enough volunteers. In the case of a shortfall, team leaders will be able to access our soon-to-be-expanded list of "freelance" volunteers.

Circles have been a way for our newer members and friends to find connection and become involved. We hope Emmaus Teams will continue to provide that opportunity and that all of you will find community while working with your team.

Being an active member of an Emmaus Team is a way to be involved in a **ministry of welcome and hospitality**. Yes, there are tasks that need to be done, but if you look at those tasks as a *ministry* instead of a *job* you might feel differently about them. And you might just see the face of God in the person you are serving.

## FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF THE

# Poor People's Campaign

## A NATIONAL CALL FOR MORAL REVIVAL

1. We are rooted in a moral analysis based on our deepest religious and constitutional values that demand justice for all. Moral revival is necessary to save the heart and soul of our democracy.
2. We are committed to lifting and deepening the leadership of those most affected by systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, and ecological devastation and to building unity across lines of division.
3. We believe in the dismantling of unjust criminalization systems that exploit poor communities and communities of color and the transformation of the "War Economy" into a "Peace Economy" that values all humanity.
4. We believe that equal protection under the law is non-negotiable.
5. We believe that people should not live in or die from poverty in the richest nation ever to exist. Blaming the poor and claiming that the United States does not have an abundance of resources to overcome poverty are false narratives used to perpetuate economic exploitation, exclusion, and deep inequality.
6. We recognize that the centrality of systemic racism in maintaining economic oppression must be named, detailed and exposed empirically, morally and spiritually. Poverty and economic equality cannot be understood apart from a society built on white supremacy.
7. We aim to shift the distorted moral narrative often promoted by religious extremists in the nation from personal issues like prayer in school, abortion, sexuality, gun rights, property rights to systemic injustices like how our society treats the poor, those on the margins, the least of these, women, children, workers, immigrants and the sick; equality and representation under the law; and the desire for peace, love and harmony within and among nations.
8. We will build up the power of people and state-based movements to serve as a vehicle for a powerful moral movement in the country and to transform the political, economic and moral structures of our society.
9. We recognize the need to organize at the state and local level—many of the most regressive policies are being passed at the state level, and these policies will have long and lasting effect, past even executive orders. This movement is not from above but below.
10. We will do our work in a non-partisan way—no elected officials or candidates get the stage or serve on the State Organizing Committee of the Campaign. This is not about left or right, Democrat or Republican, but about right and wrong.
11. We uphold the need to do a season of sustained nonviolent civil disobedience as a way to break through the tweets and shift the moral narrative. We are demonstrating the power of people coming together across issues and geography and putting our bodies on the line to the issues that are affecting us all.
12. The Campaign and all its Participants and Endorsers embrace nonviolence. Violent tactics or actions will not be tolerated.
