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WORSHIP NOTES

Although the idea behind the ***Beloved Community*** is timeless, the phrase was first used by philosopher-theologian Josiah Royce (1855–1916) who founded the Fellowship of Reconciliation. It was then popularized by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929–1968) and the Civil Rights movement. Rev. Dr. King used this phrase in his “Sermon on Gandhi” preached to Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, AL on March 22, 1959.

TODAY'S SPECIAL GUESTS



Today's guest preacher is **Rev. Rhina Ramos**. Rev. Rhina was born in El Salvador and grew up a bold, playful, and curious kid, always asking big questions and stirring up fun with her brother. At 14, she made the treacherous journey north with her aunt and brother to reunite with her mother in New York. The trip was dangerous, but Rhina held onto her faith, promising God she'd go back to church if she made it safely. She kept that promise.

Landing in Long Island brought culture shock. To overcome it, she found community in her Salvadoran neighbors and a welcoming Baptist church where her love of faith deepened and her passion for justice began to grow. Over the years, Rhina navigated law school, activism, counseling, divorce, coming out, and confronting the kind of religious rejection too many queer people face. In law school, she volunteered for an openly queer woman whose work in public interest was often dedicated to helping immigrants, further forcing Rhina to challenge her own perspectives on religion, sexuality, and community.

Her lifelong search for meaning and community led her to seminary and, eventually, to her true calling: founding Ministerio Latino in 2011. Since then, she's become known as the “pastor of the queers,” offering spiritual care, mutual aid, and holy mischief wherever it's needed. Another fun nickname is “Holy Troublemaker,” an accolade she was awarded in 2025 by the LGBTQ Religious Archives Network.

In 2024, she published her first book *In My Heart, A Volcano: A Memoir in Vignettes*. The book contains the extraordinary stories of ordinary people. People who survived violence and war, women who liberated themselves from abuse, and the memories of a Salvadoran girl that inspire hope and triumph. The book was originally written in Spanish and is now available in English as well.

With her wife Shinobu cheering her on, she continues to build the kind of community she wishes she had growing up: one where queer, trans, and immigrant folks can be fully themselves and fully loved, con pelos, señales, y todo.



Today’s guest vocalist is **Marvin Matthews**. Growing up in inner-city Washington, DC, Marvin recalls his mother singing hymns to herself when he was very young. He began studying music at age eight and would later start the first gospel choir at his junior high school there. He has performed at churches and with symphonies around the world; entertained athletes at three Summer Olympic Games; and performed on television. His exuberant personality, combined with his unique vocal talent and compassionate spirit, cross all socio-economic and racial lines. Marvin truly perceives

his ministry of music as a way to express his love for Jesus and the body of Christ to which he ministers. His enthusiasm envelops the listener; hearing him, one can’t help but feel the presence of the Divine.

Pastor Todd and Miguel became friends with Marvin during their time as members of Cathedral of Hope UCC in Dallas. In awe of his musical talents—which he very clearly understood and proclaimed were a gift from God to *honor* God—they invited him to sing the Lord’s Prayer at their wedding. Since then, they have stayed in touch with Marvin and last year had the opportunity to visit a San Francisco faith community who had invited Marvin to share his ministry of music with them. It was that occasion that birthed the idea of inviting him to DCC to share his gifts with DCC and our community.

Marvin’s desire is to use music to effect change and provide a place of joy where hopelessness has prevailed. Referencing the hymn *His Eye is on the Sparrow*, Marvin truly “sings because he is happy” and “sings because he is free.”

Welcoming the Immigrants in Our Communities

Would you like to know how people in Contra Costa and Alameda Counties are responding to the on-going vilification and dehumanization of immigrants in our local communities? It describes over a dozen volunteer opportunities and provides resources for immigrants and for community members who want to help immigrants. A Migration-Focused Worship Series for Epiphany

Migration—the movement of humans from one place to another—is a deeply complex, often divisive, and significantly misunderstood state of being. Referencing Biblical stories of migration, including the journey of “sages from the East” to visit the baby Jesus in Bethlehem—also known as “the Epiphany”—and Jesus’ family’s subsequent flight to Egypt to find safety and refuge, we will take a deeper look at the state of migration—historically, religiously, and spiritually—to see what we can observe and maybe learn about this beautifully human and spiritual state.
