

Until we are clouds that tear like bread but mend like bones. Until we weave each other like silk sheets shrouding mountains, or bear gales that shear us. Until we soften our hard edges, free to become any shape imaginable: a rose or an angel crafted by the breeze like papier-maché or a lion or dragon like marble chiseled by gusts. Until we scatter ourselves—pebbles of grey puffs, but then band together like stringed pearls. Until we learn to listen to each other, as thunderous as opera or as soft as a showered lullaby. Until we truly treasure the sunset, lavish it in mauve, rust, and rose. Until we have the courage to vanish like sails into the horizon, or be at peace, anchored still. Until we move without any measure, as vast as continents or as petite as islands, floating in an abyss of virtual blue we belong to. Until we dance tango with the moon and comfort the jealous stars, falling. Until we care enough for the earth to bless it as morning fog. Until we realize we're muddy as puddles, pristine as lakes not yet clouds. Until we remember we're born from rivers and dewdrops. Until we are at ease to dissolve as wispy showers, not always needing to clash like godly yells of thunder. Until we believe lightning roots are not our right to the ground. Though we collude into storms that ravage, we can also sprinkle ourselves like memories. Until we tame the riot of our tornadoes, settle down into a soft drizzle, into a daydream. Though we may curse with hail, we can absolve with snowflakes. We can die valiant as rainbows, and hold light in our lucid bodies like blood. We can decide to move boundlessly, without creed or desire. Until we are clouds meshed within clouds sharing a kingdom with no king, a city with no walls, a country with no name, a nation without any borders or claim. Until we abide as one together in one single sky.

WORSHIP NOTES



Richard Blanco is an acclaimed Cuban-American poet, author, and civil engineer known for his poignant explorations of identity, home, and belonging, notably serving as the youngest, first Latino, immigrant, and openly gay U.S. [Presidential Inaugural Poet](#) in 2013, reading "One Today" for [Barack Obama](#)'s second inauguration, and recently awarded the [National Humanities Medal](#). Born in Spain to Cuban exiles and raised in Miami, his work bridges cultures, blending his engineering background with lyrical storytelling in collections like *City of a Hundred Fires* and his memoir *The Prince of Los Cocuyos*.

The Apostles' Creed originated from early Christian baptismal formulas in Rome around the 2nd century, evolving from the Old Roman Creed, not written by the apostles themselves, though its core beliefs reflect their teachings. It developed through additions and refinements, with its present form emerging by the 8th century. The United Church of Christ honors the Apostles' Creed as part of its shared Christian heritage—not as mandatory 'tests' of faith but as important "testimonies" or historical expressions of faith.



The adaptation of the Apostles' Creed used in worship today was written by the **Rev. Jose Luis Casal**, an immigrant to the USA from Cuba and director of Presbyterian World Mission. Rev. Casal's version reframes the traditional Apostles' Creed through the lived experience of an immigrant, highlighting themes of displacement, foreignness, and finding home in faith, inspired by his own journey from Communist Cuba and his commitment to welcoming strangers, making faith relevant to contemporary issues of immigration and belonging. The Immigrant Apostles' Creed is offered as a prayer of solidarity with people experiencing migration and is designed to sharpen the mission of the institutional church with respect to immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees.



A Migration-Focused Worship Series for Epiphany

Migration—the movement of humans from one place to another—is a deeply complex, often divisive, and significantly misunderstood state of being. Referencing Biblical stories of migration, including the journey of “sages from the East” to visit the baby Jesus in Bethlehem—also known as “the Epiphany”—and Jesus’ family’s subsequent flight to Egypt to find safety and refuge, we will take a deeper look at the state of migration—historically, religiously, and spiritually—to see what we can observe and maybe learn about this beautifully human and spiritual state.
