Several sources have been cited as its origins, including the spiritual "No more auction block for me" based on the tune known as Sicilian Mariners; an old Baptist hymn "I'll Be All Right"; and part of the text from C. A. Tindley's gospel hymn "I'll Overcome Someday."

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WORSHIP NOTES

Today's returning musical guest is DCC friend **Elana Bolds**, the visionary behind Visions of Hope Outreach in Richmond and creator of the Put the Guns Down movement. Elana, a promoter and singer-songwriter, is a Community Organizer and Event Planner for the cities of Richmond and Oakland. She has been recognized multiple times for her work over the past 29 years that has made a profound impact in the community.



Lord You Are Welcome is a contemporary gospel song written by Kurt Lykes and popularized by Bishop Clarence E. McClendon & The Harvest Fire Mega Mass Choir. It was released on the album *Shout Hallelujah*. The song is characterized by its soulful, worshipful, and high-energy appeal, focusing on inviting the presence of God.



The song "We Shall Overcome" has left an indelible mark on American culture. Part gospel hymn, part protest anthem of the civil rights movement, the origin of the song had been in doubt, until recently.

Published in 1947 as "We Will Overcome" in the People's Songs, the tune had been attributed to folk singer Pete Seeger, who heard Black tobacco workers singing a similar tune during a strike in the 1940s. Though Seeger never claimed to write it, many credited him for bringing it forward and turning it into one of the most popular theme songs during the protests in the 1960s.

Others have linked the origins of "We Shall Overcome" to a Reverend Charles Albert Tindle, a Methodist minister who published a song called in 1901 called "I'll Overcome Someday," and to formerly enslaved workers who would often sing of overcoming while they worked.



The **Rev. Dr. Cheryl A. Lindsay** serves as pastor and teacher to First Congregational UCC of Wellington, Ohio and is the Minister for Worship and Theology for the United Church of Christ. She is a public theologian and worship scholar-practitioner with a particular interest in the proclamation of the word in gathered communities. Rev. Dr. Lindsay attended the University of Pennsylvania and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics with a concentration in Marketing. In 2012, she graduated with honors from Ashland Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree with a concentration in Evangelism and Church Renewal.

The Doctor of Worship Studies at The Robert E. Webber Institute of Worship Studies was conferred upon Rev. Cheryl in June 2018.



The **Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.** was a Baptist minister and civil rights activist who had a seismic impact on race relations in the United States, beginning in the mid-1950s. Among his many efforts, King headed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Through his nonviolent activism and inspirational speeches, he played a pivotal role in ending legal segregation of Black Americans as well as the creation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. King won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, among several other honors. Assassinated by James Earl Ray, King died on April 4, 1968, at age 39. He continues to be remembered as one of the most influential and inspirational Black leaders in history.

I Know I've Been Changed is a traditional African American spiritual that emerged in the early 20th century, with its earliest known printing in the 1915 collection National Jubilee Melodies. It is a song rooted in Baptist and Pentecostal traditions, symbolizing personal conversion, baptism, and the transformation of a new life.

This Little Light of Mine is well-known in many parts of the world with variations in lyrics and melody. Participants in the civil rights movement of the 1950s and 60s sang this powerful anthem as they faced their oppressors with strength and dignity. The lyrics are easily adaptable and well-suited to improvisation. Christian church groups commonly sing "This Little Light of Mine," though the song's message is not explicitly religious. The origins of "This Little Light of Mine" are unknown. Many exceedingly talented musicians of color have contributed to our classical music culture, and **William Grant Still** (1895–1978) endures among the greatest of them all. He was born into a musical golden era—early 20th-century America, where jazz, pop, classical, and even film music overlapped as never before—just as he was born into the vile system we now call Jim Crow. Because of all the firsts he managed to achieve, he became known as the Dean of African American Composers. William Grant Still's

contributions to music were posthumously honored with his induction into the Mississippi Musicians Hall of Fame in 1999. His pioneering spirit, innovative compositions, and unwavering dedication to his craft have solidified his place as a trailblazer in American music history. William Grant Still's journey from a young musician in Mississippi to a trailblazing composer is a testament to his remarkable talent and enduring legacy. His groundbreaking achievements have left an indelible mark on American music, inspiring future generations to embrace diversity and creativity in their artistic pursuits.

Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history.

African Americans have played a central role in shaping U.S. history. From slavery and its abolition to the Great Migration, the civil rights movement and military, scientific, cultural and political achievements, explore key moments, milestones, facts and figures in Black History. 

A Preview of our Lenten Series

Lent was originally a season for new converts to learn and prepare for their baptism on Easter. During that time, they would study what was central to Christianity. In crafting this series, the Sanctified Art team studied what was central to Jesus' life and ministry: radical welcome, love for neighbor, care for the vulnerable, nourishment for the hungry, nonviolence in the face of injustice. At the heart of Jesus' teachings, we find liberation, love, mercy, and grace—all of which are meant to be very good news for us all.

Jesus' words are easily distorted and sanitized in our modern world. Following Jesus leads to a richer, more expansive life, but it's not necessarily comfortable. Jesus' ministry can be described as "radical" which comes from the Latin word "radicalis," meaning "root" or "ground." Therefore, the good news should bring us back to our roots. Emulating Jesus and embodying his teachings should ground us in who God created us to be. Can we be "good news" people in a world too often burdened by bad news?

This Lent, let us remember that the good news really is good news. It is joyful—like fine wine saved for celebration. It grows like a mustard seed and smells like perfume poured from an alabaster jar. It tastes like bread passed endlessly through a hungry crowd. It sounds like laughter and feels like mercy. The good news is alive in the world.

The hope for this series is that it will provide fertile ground for conversation and worship, rooting our hearts and lives in the expansive goodness of God. This Lent, let the teachings of Jesus lead us forward. May the good news inspire us to take action in a world desperate to hear, see, and taste what is good.

A DCC Anti-Racism Spring Workshop

Beginning in March

All-Church Spring Workshop Series –Ethnic Storytelling

For many years, now, DCC has demonstrated a sincere commitment to justice, racial equity, and faithful public witness. We all are now witnessing the level of racism in society that is happening on a daily basis that is causing many of us to question our stories of what is real and true and long for practices that are spiritually grounding, relationally meaningful, and sustainable.

To revitalize and extend our commitment to Anti-Racism, DCC is offering a new workshop series—*Ethnic Storytelling*—that offers a refreshing entry point into this work. Rather than beginning with what people should “do” or should “know,” this process—facilitated by DCC friend **the Rev. Riana Shaw Robinson**—begins with who we already are: our families, migration stories, losses, values, faith traditions, and survival stories.

Workshops will be held on the following Sundays during Second Hour (lunch will be provided):

April 26

For white Christians, this deep work is especially valuable. Whiteness often goes unnamed and unexamined, leaving justice work feeling external, intellectual, or burdensome. Naming one’s own ethnic story restores particularity, responsibility, and agency—without centering guilt or defensiveness. By connecting this way with ourselves and others, we can more readily see and identify areas of need and attention in our own world experience.

This process is designed to help us:

- Re-ground justice commitments in faith, relationship, and story
- Reduce burnout by shifting from performative antiracism to formative practices
- Build the spiritual and relational capacity needed for long-term justice engagement

Sign-ups will be held during coffee time in February/March and online.

Participation in each session is suggested but all are welcome no matter how many sessions they can attend. Visitors, friends, and neighbors are always welcome!


Saturday, March 14th at 1:00pm **Visions of Hope—Homeless Outreach Event!**

Our partner congregation, Visions of Hope, is holding an outreach event for unhoused people in Oakland on March 14th, beginning at 1:00pm on MLK Drive near the 27th St. Exit. They are creating 100 "blessing bags" for distribution, including snacks and toiletries. They are also collecting clean and useable clothing and shoes for adults, which they will distribute at the same time. If you are able to assist with this project, either by donating supplies/clothing and/or by helping distribute the bags, please sign up on the clipboard after church, or send an email to Barb DeBarger, bdebarger@gmail.com. Here are the specific items needed—please bring items to the church office or to Koinonia during coffee hour by March 7th:

- Donations of adult-sized clothing and shoes (used okay, but clean and good condition)
- Donations of suitable food-- crackers, canned meat/sausages, snacks, small juice boxes and small bottled water—items able to fit into gallon Ziploc bags
- Gallon-sized Ziploc bags
- \$\$ to pay for a U-Haul van to transport items to the park and for lunch (collection envelope at church or give online to DCC's Visions of Hope Sponsorship Fund <https://secure.myvanco.com/L-ZCT3/campaign/C-15G87.>)
- Distribution volunteers—we will organize a carpool from DCC for those interested in helping at the event and also announce parking arrangements soon.

Journeys in Faith Survey Summary

The Journeys in Faith committee is thankful for the forty-nine people who responded to our survey in the fourth quarter of 2025. The committee designed the survey to gather information about sessions that would interest the congregation, and the preferred time for the sessions. The high response rate means that the survey results are representative of the congregation. Of those responding, 59% attended a Journeys in Faith session during the prior year, 69% were female, 90% were white, the average age was seventy, and the average time at DCC was nineteen years. People attended Journeys in Faith sessions because they were interested in the topic and for education. Conflict with other commitments was the primary reason for people not attending. Most respondents liked the sessions in the second hour after the service, though there were other suggestions. Social justice is the topic area of greatest interest followed by faith development and spiritual practices as shown here:

We appreciate the suggestions included with the survey feedback and the eight people who expressed an interest in facilitating a session now or in the future.
